**Events** 

- Central Coast APA has partnered with Santa Barbara County to offer a free "Brown Bag Lunch Discussion Series" on a wide variety of emerging planning topics. #### **AICP Exam**

In December, the Central Coast APA will host informational sessions for members considering applying for and taking the AICP exam to become certified planners. The sessions will cover eligibility requirements, the application process, exam content, and will provide application preparation and study tips. The Central Coast Section provides ongoing support to members preparing to take the AICP exam by providing or directing them to study materials, responding to questions regarding the AICP exam and application process and helping to organize study groups.

## **Central Coast Legislative Update**

On September 23<sup>rd</sup> the Ventura Subsection hosted a legislative update from 2-5 p.m. in Ventura with Sande George. The San Luis Obispo and Santa Barbara County subsection membership were invited to attend this program. It was attended by 65 of our members and we received a lot of positive feedback.

Central Coast continues legislative monitoring and advocacy via opposition letter to AB 602 relating to the statute of limitations provisions on local jurisdiction housing elements.

# **Election Update**

The Central Coast Section will be conducting elections for five Board positions in November. The positions include Section Director-elect, Professional Development Officer, Finance Officer, Public Information Officer and Membership Inclusion Officer. The term of office for each position is two years, beginning January 2011. The election will be complete and results published by mid-December. Nominations have been solicited and all Central Coast Section APA members have been notified by email and newsletter.

## **Citizens Planning Academy**

The Central Coast Section organized and sponsored a "citizen planning academy," which was an 8-week course in local land use planning and civic engagement, where interested members of the public received training in 'Land Use 101.' The course was a success in assisting participants to become more informed, confident and comfortable in participating in local land use planning decisions, and was ideally suited to help prepare participants to serve on local advisory boards, such as Planning Commissions and other land use-related committees. In an instruction format mix of lecture, panel discussion and group interaction, the academy covers a broad range of planning topics: zoning history and legal context; environmental review laws and procedures; natural resource management; redevelopment, government and real estate economics; regional government, SOAR and LAFCO;

transportation and infrastructure; urban design and smart growth; water and utility planning and constraints, affordable housing, ethics and civic engagement. The classes were held at California Lutheran University, Oxnard Graduate Center. We proudly graduated 40 newly informed citizen planners! This was such a success that our plans are to take this on the road and start an academy in Santa Barbara and SLO Counties.

## Santa Barbara to Host the 2011 California APA Conference

The Co-Chairs (Paul Wack & Kim Prillhart) and the Conference Host Committee has been set. Our kick-off meeting was on June 8<sup>th</sup> in Santa Barbara and we have had monthly meetings since then. ## LOS ANGELES SECTION

- The LA Section 2012 National Conference Committee held a kick-off event on October 14. Over 100
  people attended eager to serve as volunteers for Local Host Committee. The room was filled with
  enthusiasm and conference co-chairs are excited to get the local host events rolling. Stay tuned, this
  is going to be an exciting year!
- The APA LA Young Planners Group began a six month Mentorship Series of intimate gatherings between new planners and some of LA's most experienced, progressive planning professionals in August. These events provide attendees an opportunity to ask questions, gain helpful advice, and learn from the experiences of these amazing mentors. Mentors have included: Steve Preston, Susan Healy Keene, Amy Bodek and Karen Warner!
- Most recently, the Los Angeles Section was fortunate to be able to spend an evening with a visiting
  planner from down under! Chris Bain, one of Brisbane City Council's senior urban planners, gave a
  presentation on how the Brisbane City Council is leading the transformation of Australia's third
  largest City. With the stated aim of shaping Brisbane as Australia's New World City, the City Council
  of Brisbane has placed planning, design, transport and sustainability at the forefront of an ambitious
  City building agenda.
- October 22 is scheduled for an overview of Port Master Planning in the Port of Long Beach. This session is designed to provide a broad perspective on the major issues facing ports, master planning for ports, and strategies ports utilize as a means of remaining competitive while being sensitive to

- their neighbors. The discussion will include operational and regional economics, growth, and planning considerations. A tour of the Alameda Corridor is scheduled for the late morning.
- The 5th annual APA LA student symposium will get underway on Saturday, November 13 at UCLA.
   The agenda includes speakers from the Community Corporation of Santa Monica and an update on the Burbank Bicycle Master Plan.

  community of San Bruno and City staff needed volunteer planners to help ease the workload.
  Planners of all ability levels helped planning staff with assistant and associate level tasks such as
  answering questions at the counter, answering phones, and filing associated paperwork.
- I was honored to represent the Section and the state at the presentation of APA's Great Places in America award to the Ferry Building on October 13.

  retrofitting impervious areas with landscaping. 5.5 CM credits
- Walking Tour/Mission Dolores Neighborhood. Learn about the Mission, the neighborhood, the lake that vanished, and the spot many consider the birthplace of SF. Tour leader: Tam Tran—transportation planner, APA member, and volunteer guide for San Francisco City Guides. Free to APA members. Space is limited. Tour will end with no-host networking from 5–7 PM at Elixir. 1 CM credit

<u>Presentation on Recycled Water Projects</u>. City of Watsonville. This is the 2nd in a series of three
panels on water issues in the Monterey Bay Area addressing Recycled Water. The relationship of
recycled water projects for both agricultural and urban areas will be discussed by a panel of experts.
The panel will be followed by a tour of the Pajaro Recycled Water facility. 6 CM credits

- Monterey Branch Line Light Rail Project Presentation. The APA, AEP, and TAMC will host a no-cost brown bag lunch presentation on the Monterey Branch Line of the light rail project.

- Redwood Coast RAC Social Mixer. Meet under the statue of President McKinley at Arcata Plaza,
   Arcata. Socialize with fellow planners at Robert Goodman Wines Tasting Room in Arcata preceded by
   a walking tour of public art and low-impact development improvements.
- Understanding AB 32 and SB 375 A Legal Analysis (webinar). The Institute for Local Government hosted a webinar to provide city and county officials (and others) with accurate and objective information to help them understand how AB 32 and SB 375 directly impact cities and counties, and the role that local officials will play in the implementation of both laws. The webinar featured an online presentation by Betsy Strauss, author of the new guides. Betsy is Special Counsel to the ILG and the League of California Cities and an attorney and mediator based in Napa. 1.5 CM Law credits
- Healthy Rural Communities Regional Forum. Fortuna. Learn how rural northern counties are making
  a difference in creating healthy communities with successes in transportation, food systems, Safe
  Routes to Schools, and healthy rural development tools. Lunch provided. Sponsored by Humboldt
  County Health and Human Services, The California Endowment, and the California Center for Rural
  Policy.
- Workshop on Stormwater Development Standards. The City of Salinas will be hosting a half day seminar for design professionals to review and discuss the City's new development standards for stormwater. It covers LID/BMPs/IMPs and their specific application for conformance with the City's Storm Water Development Standards. The City is the only NPDES Phase 1 City in RWQCB Region 3 and holder of its own storm water permit. 4 CM credits

#### October

- <u>Presentation on Coastal Water Projects</u>. Monterey. Addressing the water needs of the Monterey Bay Area is essential to plan for growth and development and resource conservation. This is the 3rd in a series of three panels on water issues in the Monterey Bay Area, and will address the topic of Coastal Water Projects. The panel will be followed by a tour of the Sand City DSAL facility. **6 CM credits**
- Bay Area Planning Directors' Fall Meeting: Best Practices for Greener Site Development. Low impact development tools to conserve water, protect watersheds, prevent flooding, become more sustainable, and beautify communities. Speakers: Teresa Eade, Bay-Friendly Landscaping; Keith Lichten, SF Bay Regional Water Quality Control Board; and Lynn Simon, FAIA, Simon & Associates. Plus a panel moderated by Charlie Knox, AICP, Benicia, with David Cropper, TMG Partners; Ed Reiskin, Director of Public Works, San Francisco; Peter Schulze-Allen, Emeryville; Scott Taylor, CA Stormwater Quality Association; and Paul Lettieri, The Guzzardo Partnership. 3 CM credits

- Global Sustainable Development in the Age of Climate Change. First of six sessions in a Sustainable
  Development and Climate Change Certificate Program. Faculty include Alex Hinds, Valentin Alexeeff,
  FAICP, and Tom Jacobson, AICP. 7 CM credits per one-day session
- San Francisco APA, Walking Tour of Visitacion Valley. Meet at Bayshore Boulevard and Blanken Avenue in front of the Schlage Lock Historic Building (walkable from MUNI T-line Arleta Station and Caltrain Bayshore Station). We will visit San Francisco's Redevelopment Area, including the Leland Avenue Street Improvement Project and the awardwinning Visitacion Valley Greenway. The tour will be led by San Francisco RDA/Planning/DPW, the Visitacion Valley Greenway Project, and Universal Paragon Corporation. Free to APA members. 1.5 CM credits
- YPG presents "Public Engagement in the 21st Century." Do Facebook, Twitter, and Wikiplanning only ignite feelings of confusion? YPG will showcase several social media outlets as tools for public engagement in a social atmosphere with opportunities for networking. 2 CM credits
- <u>The Brisbane Experience: Planning, Design, Transport & Sustainability in Australia's 3rd City</u>. San Francisco. Speaker is Chris Bain, Senior Urban Planner and Brisbane City Council (Australia) member.

  1.5 CM credits
- <u>Cities for all Ages: Planning and Our Aging Population</u>. This presentation by Don Weden focuses on the need to adapt our land use plans, policies, and patterns to meet the needs of our rapidly-aging population (many of whom will be non-drivers, living in communities that were planned around the automobile). This presentation addresses the basic needs of seniors and the ways that land use planning and development can help create communities that meet these needs while benefiting our economy, environment, and people of all ages. 1 CM credits
- Brown bag session on Sustainable Land Use and Transportation. Session highlighting TransForm's
  GreenTRIP certification. GreenTRIP certification requires development be located near transit
  stations in walkable neighborhoods and apply traffic-reduction strategies such as offering discounted
  transit passes or car-sharing memberships to residents. Confirmed speakers include Ann Cheng of
  TransForm and Andrea Osgood of Eden Housing, Inc. Co-sponsored by APA and ITE. 1.5 CM credits
- <u>CALGreen Building Code Workshop</u>. Hear representatives from the California Department of Housing and Community Development and California Building Standards Commission and discuss the new mandatory CALGreen Building Code, which will become effective on January 1, 2011. Workshop is suitable for planners, building officials, architects, contractors, and green industry practitioners.

## **ORANGE SECTION**

 Professional Development: Planning Forum: Our annual local section training in conjunction with the Planning Director's Association was held at the Nixon Library and Birthplace in Yorba Linda. We had a Morning session on Thriving in Times of Uncertainty followed by a panel that talked about volunteerism and then a session on the Promise and Predicaments of the Young Planner that included a panel of four student/young professionals. The day concluded with an inspiring session on Listening. The event was well attended and a welcome change in dialogue from our typical SB375, CEQA topics. Sponsors hosted booths, networking and advertising was offered and both public sector and private sector professionals gained value from this tremendous event. In addition we held four lunch programs in various locations in the County to allow our members to gain valuable information and continued education, low cost access to CM credits and networking time. We offered topics on and finally in October we tackled the challenging conversation of "the City of Bell" by talking to City Manager's in our region on what it takes to run a city, the politics, the pressure, the media and how ethics and leading play a critical role. Typically we have 40-60 people at our lunchtime programs.

- Board: The Orange Section Board is working to improve the process and policies that we work
  within. We have adopted our revised bylaws and have included job descriptions for our new
  appointed positions. We have also included the elected position of a Section Director elect. Our
  nominations committee is working to seek out qualified and interested candidates to fill both our
  appointed and elected positions. We are looking forward to a great slate of engaged professionals.
- Awards: We have begun to raise interest and awareness of the upcoming awards program. It seems
  that many times our Section (as is probably true for many) is caught off guard when the new year
  roles around and the Award's package is due. So we are doing a good amount of work to advertise
  this now and work to bring attention to the need to have lots of submittals. We are even working to
  help cities with the award submissions by teaming them with volunteers to help with the package.
- Student Programs: We attended the new Master's of Urban Planning Orientation at UCI this fall to welcome students into the program and to tell them about APA and the benefits of joining the Section. We shared about the free student membership, the discounts to programs and conferences and were able to distribute information about our scholarship program.
- Golf Tournament: In conjunction with the Planning Directors of Orange County we hosted our annual Golf Tournament to raise funds for student scholarships. We had a great turn out of nearly 100 golfers and had a wonderful day of networking, golf and raising money for this great cause.
- Scholarships: We have launched our Bob Goldin Scholarship program. We sent initiations to all the
  planning school in Orange County as well as in surrounding communities where students may live in
  Orange County and commute to school. We will be receiving applications and awarding six
  scholarships \$500 each in memory of Bob Goldin. The announcement of winners will be made at our
  annual holiday mixer in December.
- Membership: We held two great membership/social events this summer. The Pageant of the
  Masters and tailgating and baseball with the Angels. We co-hosted these events with AEP and had
  more than 100 people come out and share in the fun. We are now working on our holiday mixer and
  a membership drive that will take place in the early spring.
- Website and Newsletter: We have started our "Highlights of Orange County" section of the newsletter where we will be putting the spotlight on specific cities each month on the website and in the newsletter. This first issue spotlights our oldest city in the County, Anaheim. This new series is aimed at allowing cities to tell "what they are doing" and it is our hope that we will not only share information but build a sustainable "wiki" type resource for our membership to draw from other's

experience, success and challenges. We have also been working to update and improve our website. Our content has been severely out of date and we are working to improve the information contained as well as the navigation around the site. Finally we put together a budget overview discussion in our summer newsletter and received great feedback from our membership asking terrific questions and providing great insight into what they would want to see in the future and how much they learned about the Section.

- AICP: We were able to offer AICP preparation training by combining with other sections for a one-day workshop this summer. We also provided outreach to our members that were on the list to lose their AICP status and worked to find ways to help them either meet their credits (by enrolling in webinars) or even teaming some members with more technology savvy members who could help them solve their issues with logging their credits. We received great responses from our AICP members for this help and we believe we were able to avoid at least 20 members losing status because of this effort.
- Education: We will be hosting two events for National Planning Month in the Section. APA has designated October as National Community Planning Month as a way to raise the visibility of the profession, recognize the work of planners in creating communities of lasting value, and inspire the next generation of planners. This year's theme is "Sustaining Places." To honor the occasion, APA Orange Section will be hosting a booth at two community events, and we need volunteers to help! Volunteers will engage attendees in interactive and fun planning exercises, as well as distribute information and answer questions about the planning profession.
