Re: Membership Inclusion Director Report

CCAPA total membership remained fairly unchanged (6,000 members) between March 2006 and May 2007. In 2006, only 60 percent of the members responded to the race/ethnicity questions. With an e-mail announcement that was sent to get more members to answer those personal demographic questions through the APA website, the respondent rate has increased to 65 percent.

Comparing data between 2006 and 2007, all racial and ethnic groups increased slightly in actual numbers except for Hispanic which took a dramatic drop. This might be an issue that APA staff "over-corrected" some data. It should be noted that for Census data, persons of Hispanic origin may be of any race. In this database, Hispanic is counted as a race category and would not produce a double counting of a certain race and Hispanic, for example.

The current composition of the CCAPA membership (with 65 percent reporting): 85% White, 8% Asian, 3% Black, 2% Hispanic, 1% American Indian, and 1% Multiracial. California's population by race: 47% White, 33% Hispanic, 11% Asian, 7% Black, 2% Multiracial, and 1% American Indian. These percentages do not add up to 100% due to rounding. APA and the planning field need to produce a better "ratio" from the "racial" perspective.

The Diversity Summit will be held at this year's CCAPA Conference in San José on Sunday, September 30th at 4pm. We will explore the importance of understanding diversity in our profession and educating urban planning professionals about ethnicity in our communities and its relationship to good urban planning. Furthermore, we will help identify specific strategies for implementation by CCAPA and the Diversity Directors within each Section.

The Section Membership Inclusion Directors convened for a conference call on June 15th. The conference call participants included Ralph Kachadourian (Central Section), Heather Allen and Brian Pedrotti (Central Coast Section), Aaron Pfannenstiel (Inland Empire Section), Rogelio Flores (Los Angeles Section), Michele Rodriguez (Northern Section), David Crook (Orange Section), and Chantelle Swaby (San Diego Section).

Even though they vary in size and types of diversity, the eight California Sections face similar issues and challenges. Some Sections have already been going to high schools, colleges, and universities to give students an ideal of what planning is and what planners do. The conference call participants agree that reaching students prior to them making decisions on their careers would be most productive in getting more into the planning field.

Once a student decides to go into planning, mentoring may be an important next step. Even though there are students currently willing to participate in this type of program, it is very difficult to find enough seasoned planners willing to commit. The Section Membership Inclusion Directors agree to collaborate with each other in sharing ideas and perhaps producing joint programs with neighboring Sections.
